HCC Intern Reading Plan

Below is the reading plan for the internship program. Our desire is primarily to develop your character as a follower of Christ. This will be crucial to a life of fruitful ministry going forward. We also hope to help build an understanding in regards to the church (local *and* global), theology, evangelism & discipleship, and leadership. This reading is in addition to the most important reading you will do during your time here—your Bible reading.

Bible

Every day you will read the sections for the corresponding day on our Bible Reading Plan. As you read you will take notes/observations and follow a simple pattern in at least one passage a week, to be discussed in the weekly intern meeting:

- 1. What does the text say? Summarize what the author is saying to their audience.
- 2. What does the text say about God? His character, attributes, work.
- 3. What does the text say about sin and our fallen condition?
- 4. How does the text anticipate or apply Christ's work in the gospel?
- 5. What should I confess, believe, or obey as a result of having read this?
- 6. (If applicable) Major interpretive questions or theological problems?

Books

As you read the books assigned below you will take notes. Read this short <u>article</u> by Mortimer Adler about how to take effective notes while reading. The readings will be covered in the weekly intern meetings, usually in the form of a 2-page reflection.

Know that there is also some flexibility built into this reading plan. You and Marshall will decide which books to read together.
